



Voting by post or proxy

If you are unable to go in person to vote, you can apply to vote by post or proxy. This leaflet explains what that means and how you can get a postal or proxy vote

Who can vote by post or proxy?

If you are registered to vote and intend to vote at an election but you are unable to go to the polling station you have been allocated on election day, you can apply for a postal or proxy vote.

There are different types of postal and proxy votes. You can apply to vote by post or proxy at all future elections, for a certain period of time or just for a particular election.

How do I apply to vote by post or proxy?

1. Obtain an application form by contacting us (see back of leaflet) or download a form from our website: www.eoni.org.uk.

2. Complete the application form. You must give a reason for being physically unable to attend the polling station – for example because you will be on holiday or because you have a disability. Some application forms require another person to confirm the details you have given. You will also be asked to decide whether you want to vote by post or appoint someone else (known as a 'proxy') to vote on your behalf.

3. Return the application form to the Area Electoral Office. If an election is scheduled, the form must be returned no later than 14 days before the date of the election.

What happens next?

If your application is accepted and you have chosen to:

Vote by post - a ballot paper will be sent to you approximately 10 days before the date of an election. Mark the ballot paper and return it to the Area Office before 10.00pm on the day of the election.

Vote by proxy - you must nominate another person to go to your polling station on election day and vote on your behalf. The person you choose must agree to do this and they must not have agreed to act as a proxy for more than two people unless they are related to them. A poll card will be sent to your proxy telling them which polling station to go to.
